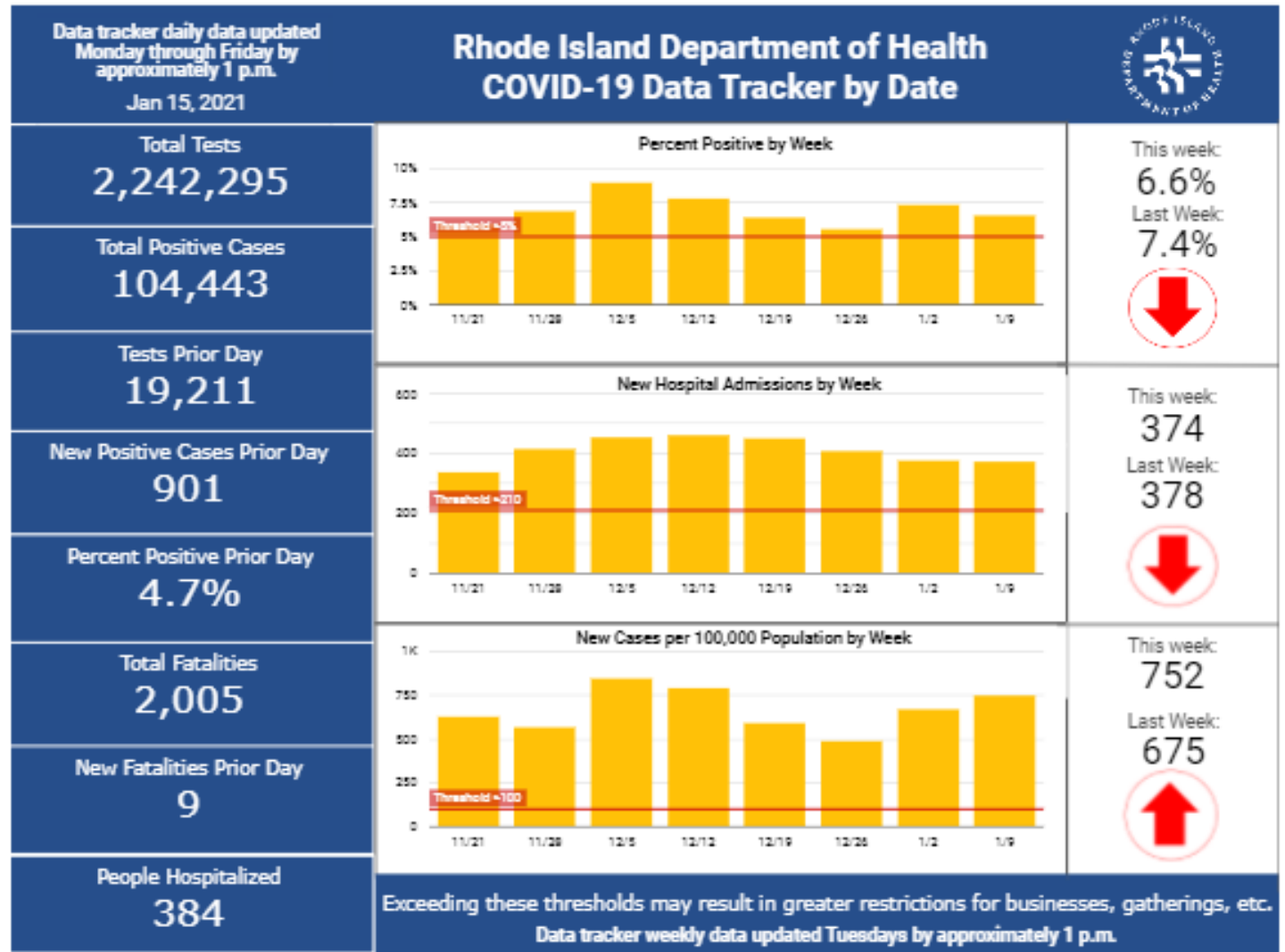

Exact timing depends on demand, doses made available to Rhode Island, and other factors. Information on who can get vaccinated in future phases will be shared as soon as possible.

COVID-19 Vaccine Provider Advisory

The Rhode Island Department of Health is sharing an update on the COVID-19 vaccine rollout.

Vaccinating outpatient providers

As priority populations in Rhode Island continue to get vaccinated against COVID-19, the vaccination campaign could include outpatient healthcare providers as early as next week. ([This is stage 1.4, within Phase 1.](#)) This process will take several weeks, as this group includes up to 65,000 people. Healthcare providers will receive a survey by Friday, 1/15 that will help the State finalize vaccination plans. **This survey has not yet gone out.*** Healthcare providers don't need to take any action beyond completing the survey, once they receive it via email.

This portion of the vaccination campaign is starting earlier than planned because Rhode Island leveraged vaccine deferred from the Pharmacy Partnership to have outpatient healthcare providers vaccinated.

**In today's press conference, it was stated that the survey had already been sent. It has not. Please expect it, via email, at the end of this week.*

How Will I Be Notified to Make An Appointment?

The exact method by which people will be notified about vaccination opportunities may vary by group. For example, hospitals notified their employees directly about vaccination opportunities. In other cases, people eligible for vaccination at mass vaccination clinics will receive a link to sign up for an appointment. Outpatient providers will also receive a signup link when vaccination opportunities become available.

Again, there is no action that people in groups who have not yet been contacted need to take at this time to get a vaccine. There is no vaccine signup list or waitlist. When we are ready to start with vaccinating each group, we will communicate with the public, healthcare providers, and community organizations as appropriate to provide instructions. In addition, we are working on methods to ensure people who do not have access to email or reliable internet service can access vaccine when they are eligible.
